

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Go Deeper . . .

Use these questions for further study individually or in a small group

Read Amos 1:3-2:16

- 1. God speaks to Israel about the surrounding nations in a way that riles up the people of Israel into a sort of self-righteous fervor only to then expose their own hypocrisy and rebellion. Why is it easier for us to see the sins of other nations than the sins of our own? In what ways do we do this as a nation? In what ways do we do this as a Church? What lesson should we take from Amos about granting ourselves special status or thinking God will not judge us?
- 2. The rebellions of the nations include: slavery, human trafficking, imperialism, desecration of the dead, war crimes, and overzealousness toward battle. Are these still issues in our world today? Where do you see them? If Amos were prophesying in the 21st Century how might he give voice to these rebellious sins?
- 3. God reserves his harshest words and judgment for his own covenant people.
 Why is this? What are the implications for us as the Church?
- 4. The rebellions of Israel include: human trafficking and slavery, disregard for the poor, perversions of the justice system against the marginalized and dispossessed, the sexual abuse of minors and vulnerable people, the ruthless treatment of those in debt, and the cavalier excesses of those with wealth. How are these things acts of rebellion against God? Where do you see these issues in our churches and society at large today? (Be specific)
- 5. What is your reaction to the claim that social justice is neither a secular concern nor something secondary to the Gospel but rather something which flows from the very character of God?
- 6. How might God be inviting you personally and us as a church into His concerns for justice?

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
