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#### <u>Use these questions for further study individually or in a small group</u>

What is your experience with the Apostles' Creed?

Is it something you grew up saying in church? Did you have to memorize it? Are you totally unfamiliar with it? Etc.

Is saying the creed something that is meaningful to you? Why/why not?

Is there anything about the creed which makes you uncomfortable? If so: What specifically, and why?

Is it important for us as modern-day Christians to understand and root ourselves in the faith of the early church? Why or why not?

- What are the potential dangers of building our faith or belief system without checking it against the historic beliefs of the Christian Church?
- How does the idea of creed as symbol (or symbolon) challenge or inform the way you engage with the Apostles' Creed?

What questions do you have about the Apostles' Creed that you hope to get answered during this series?

#### Read Hebrews 10:19 - 12:3

How do the words faith and faithful get used throughout this passage?

What does this teach us about the nature of belief?

What is the relationship between faith and perseverance?

How does this passage challenge or affirm our understanding of belief?

Apart from simply affirming the existence of God, what else does the statement "I believe in God" imply? What ought it to imply?

What do you think he means by this provocative statement?

Do you agree with him? Why/why not?

What does it look like to go beyond merely "accepting the truth of Christianity" and pushing into the deeper levels of true belief?

Is God inviting you to take a new step in your faith? If so, what is it; and how will you respond?

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
