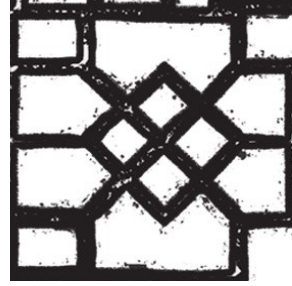




# Creed

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## Go Deeper . . .

Use these questions for further study individually or in a small group

### **. . . who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary**

This section of the Creed focuses on the historical events of Jesus' life.

Why is it significant that Christianity is grounded in history?

Why is it important to affirm the historical authenticity of these events?

Why do you think so many people in our day and throughout history have struggled with the doctrine of Jesus as both fully human and fully divine?

Do you see teachers/teachings/beliefs in our modern culture which claim that Jesus is either only God or only human? Where?

Why is it so important that Jesus really is both fully human and fully divine?

#### **Read Hebrews 2:8b-18 & 4:14-16**

How do these passages teach and affirm the dual nature of Jesus?

Are you encouraged to know that Jesus faced suffering and temptation just like all humans do? Why or why not?

According to the passage, what kind of priest is Jesus?  
What does this mean for us?

How will you live out the truths of this passage?

#### **Read Colossians 1:13-23**

How does this passage teach and affirm the dual nature of Jesus?  
Why does Paul give special attention to Christ's "physical body"?

Paul describes Jesus as "the image of the invisible God"  
What does this mean?  
Why is it significant?  
What impact does this have on us?

Paul describes Jesus as "the firstborn over all creation" and "firstborn from among the dead."  
How does this speak to Jesus' human nature? What implications does it have for us?

If Jesus is the fullest revelation of God and the fullest revelation of God's intention for humanity how should we respond to Jesus?

What does this mean for how we understand and relate to God?  
What does this mean for how we live our lives?

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
